REPORT TO COURT
(May 5, 1998)

Since the last report dated February 10, 1998, T ■■■■■ (hereafter referred to as "■■■■■") behavior has worsened. A meeting was conducted at Ma'ili Elementary to refer T ■■■■■ for special education services, in March 1998. A psychiatric evaluation was to be conducted by Dr. Ken Tremayne on or around April 29, 1998. Upon completion of the evaluation, T ■■■■■'s services can be determined.

According to the school, T ■■■■■'s behavior has deteriorated. The foster mother reportedly has had difficulty in managing T ■■■■■'s behavior and is uncertain whether she can consider adopting him. The foster mother has not reported in behavior to Malcolm Hong, Guardian Ad Litem (GAL), nor to this worker.

In April 1998, DHS facilitated a visit between T ■■■■■ and his siblings. The children were delighted and excited about seeing each other. The children are eager to have future visits, and were disappointed at learning that the visitations would occur once a month. T ■■■■■ and his siblings were reluctant to end the visit. In observing T ■■■■■ and his siblings, the affection they have for each other is very apparent. T ■■■■■ and his brother, C ■■■■■, now have phone contact with each other. The visit may have brought up feelings/issues in T ■■■■■ that he does not know how to deal with. According to the school, T ■■■■■'s behavior was worse the day after the visit. T ■■■■■ reportedly ran out of the classroom and swore at adults. This does not mean that the visits should be discontinued. However, T ■■■■■ needs therapeutic services to help him manage his feelings.

Mr. Hong and this worker have discussed the possibility of placing T ■■■■■ in a therapeutic foster home. This would afford T ■■■■■ caretakers experienced in dealing with children with behavioral/emotional issues, and give T ■■■■■ an environment in


