## **Report to the Governor January–June 2025**

The Hawai'i Paroling Authority (HPA) is an independent quasi-judicial body, which is attached to the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (DCR) for administrative purposes. HPA serves as the central paroling authority for the State of Hawaii and is responsible for the administration and discharge of all parole and community supervision programs for the State. The mission is to:

Protect the personal safety and property of each member of the community and determine the degree of self-control, dependability, and dangerousness the prisoner presents to himself and/or others.

Protection of the community and rehabilitation of the prisoner is sought by the Authority's fixing of appropriate minimum terms of imprisonment; granting or denial of parole; revocation of parole whenever necessary; and properly supervising those on parole.

### **Board**

### **Board Hearings**

The Parole Board conducts in-person hearings to establish minimum terms of imprisonment, determine readiness for release on parole, revoke parole, and Program Determination Hearings to determine when an inmate could benefit from the Sex Offender Treatment Program.

The Parole Board conducts Administrative Hearings and reviews Pardon and Commutation applications and makes recommendations to the Governor; suspends parole when a parolee's whereabouts is unknown; determines Early Discharge from Parole; renders decisions for Intrastate and Interstate transfers; determines reduction of minimum terms of imprisonment; and makes decisions for Compassionate/Medical Releases.

### **Hearing Statistics for January–June 2025**

#### **Parole Hearings – 718**

Denied: 327 (\*46%)  
Approved: 233 (32%)  
Continued: 141 (20%)  
Rescheduled: 17 (.02%)

### **Top three reasons for denied parole**

1. \*Does not want parole: 75 (23%)
  - a. Inmate wants to max out.
  - b. Inmate wants to complete programs/work furlough.
  - c. Inmate does not have a verifiable parole plan.
2. Waitlisted/participating in substance abuse treatment: 55 (17%)
3. Misconduct: 44 (13%)

### **Parole Violation Hearings – 220**

#### **Top five violations:**

1. Drug use: 45 (20%)
2. Change of residence/unknown whereabouts: 37 (17%)
3. Failure to truthfully answer PO inquiries: 33 (15%)
4. Failure to report to and maintain contact with PO: 17 (.08%)
5. Unreported contact with law enforcement: 16 (.07%)

These five violations represent 67% of the types of parole violations.

#### **Minimum Terms of Imprisonment**

The HPA guidelines for setting minimum terms serve as the criteria used to establish minimum terms of imprisonment. The guidelines provide significant factors within three levels of punishment and an applicable range of imprisonment. Although specific weights are not assigned to each factor in the criteria, the areas of focus include the nature of the offense, the degree of injury/loss to person or property, and the offender's criminal history.

For the period of January through June 2025, the Parole Board set minimum terms of imprisonment for 66 Offenses Against Property, 39 Offenses Against Persons, 18 Drug Offenses, 16 Firearms Offenses, 10 Other Offenses, and 9 Sex Offenses. Attached is a detailed description of the crimes in each category, class of Felony, Level of Punishment, and average sentence imposed.

## **HPA Field Services Branch**

### **Initiatives**

#### **Offender Re-entry**

HPA has prioritized transitioning inmates from incarceration to parole. HPA uses a collaborative re-entry approach with stakeholders including the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (DCR) and community resource agencies to affect a handoff between agencies. The handoff is created through collaborative planning that: identifies an inmate's needs; addresses criminogenic risk factors and needs; secures necessary community resources such as housing and treatment; facilitates establishing community-based pro-social networks; creates release opportunities; and coordinates wrap-around services for an inmate's successful transition into the community.

The HPA Pre-parole team undertake release planning individually through in-person contacts with inmates in our local facilities and telephone contacts with inmates in Saguaro Correctional Facility in Arizona. The officers collaborate with facility case managers and develop comprehensive parole release plans. This collaboration ensures gaps in the release planning process are filled and the necessary resources and services are in place prior to release. Critical elements include securing vital documents and identification cards, transportation, psychotropic medication, and up to \$200 of Gate Money for qualifying inmates. The enhanced re-entry planning better prepares inmates for release and facilitates informed release decision

making by the Parole Board. The Parole Board is philosophically aligned to the re-entry principles and are very supportive in creating release opportunities to facilitate a proper transition through final discharge from the criminal justice system.

### **Program Contracts**

HPA secured contracts with multiple community resource agencies primarily for housing and treatment services for the male and female post-conviction supervision population. These contracts operate by allocated funding.

### **Community Based Mental Health Housing, Programs, Resources**

There is a significant inmate population with mental illness and diagnoses that hinder progression through the correctional system. Inmates with severe mental illness are often unable to conform to program requirements in a correctional institution. Their mental illness requires a therapeutic approach with psychological and psychiatric services that meets their needs. When their mental health needs are not met, inmates are prone to decompensation, behavior regression, misconduct, escalated custody classification and an inability to participate in mainstream programs, all of which diminishes readiness for release on parole.

HPA is attempting to collaborate with the Department of Health, Adult Mental Health Division (AMHD), community resource agencies, and DCR to engage in joint efforts to address these needs. The Parole Board is in a unique position to fashion the setting of minimum terms of imprisonment and effect parole release to suitable programs. HPA believes in a therapeutic approach to transition the mentally ill population from incarceration through re-entry and into the community with appropriate housing and mental health programs and services. Historically, the barrier to parole release has been the availability of community-based housing and programs and services. HPA has also reached out to our legislative partners about this issue.

### **Leverage Technology**

HPA's technology infrastructure and use of technology could be significantly improved. HPA currently does not maximize use of available technology for creating automated documents, e-signatures, and lacks a case management database for supervision operations and data collection.

In the last year, the Parole Board Members migrated from using hard copy documents to Microsoft One Drive. This enhanced document availability and review and significantly enhanced our efficiency. The One Drive access facilitates more timely distribution of late arriving documents and makes them available during hearings. HPA will enhance our use of technology and seek future budget allotments for these improvements.

### Equipment

As HPA expands our use of technology, we are in the process of purchasing a POLYCOM or similar system and television monitor for parole officers release planning work with inmates at Saguaro Correctional Facility in Arizona. This system will also be used for team meetings with our neighbor island offices. HPA also purchased the OWL device to accommodate Parole Board hearings, staff meetings, and meetings with stakeholders.

### Capital Improvements

HPA continues to seek office space for the Specialized Services Section that supervise sex offenders, severely mentally ill, and high-risk felons. Our budget request for funding office space continues to go unmet and this remains a barrier. HPA is also looking into creating interview space in our main office. Currently, parole officers meet with parolees fronting the office on Alakea Street. Due to safety concerns, parolees do not enter secure office space. A dedicated interview space adjoining our lobby space could be used for parolee check-ins, to confidentially and safely address non-compliance, and to conduct on-demand programming. Other capital improvements include flooring and window covering replacements to improve staff safety and improve our professional appearance.
